Do Your Part!

iving in Santa Clarita, and spending as much time as I do in the Antelope Valley, you can probably imagine that the overpass and tunnels of the 5 and the 14 freeways where they intersect are a VERY familiar part of my life. In fact, that has been true not just recently, but pretty much constantly since about 1994. It was just about this exact time of year so far back I don't recall the date that I had one of the truly "AHA" experiences of my ministry years and learned a lesson I want to offer to you.

I had the responsibility to come up with a written Easter message in addition to a sermon for Easter Sunday. Time was running out and I was looking for something fresh and meaningful to say in both so that people might find a new perspective on the celebration. Like you at SSOV, they had been through dozens and dozens of Easters, and the Bible readings of the women at the tomb finding the stone rolled away was so familiar they could recite the story from memory. Because in those days the schools gave an Easter vacation, I knew many of the people were going to be gone for travel or family visiting, and Easter was becoming more and more an *obstacle* that I simply had to overcome and get through, but I was working hard mentally to make sure I did not come down to such a low place for such an important and life-giving celebration. I was on my way to Lancaster, I believe, and you may recall that the transition to the 14 from the south bound 5 involves taking the exit and slowing so you can follow a swooping overpass that results in your heading east, up hill, and joining the other eastbound traffic. There often are other cars so you have to pay attention to what you're doing.

Large structures like that have to have a drainage system to get the water off of the road when it rains, and there are grates for drains all along the left side wall of the overpass. I was the only car at that moment making

the transition, and I noticed, growing out of one of the drains a tall stalk of a plant that had a couple leaves and a yellow flower on it. I was amazed, as this was not a good place for a flowering plant! It registered on me that such a miracle could be a message, meant just for me. I did what I had to do that day in the AV and was looking forward to driving home, but eventually remembered that I would not be on that overpass. I really wanted to see that flower again, maybe take a picture! I took a complicated set of turns and a roundabout way just to see it again. The flower was in full bloom, bright yellow blowing in the breeze like an advertisement for Spring and God and life! There were too many cars to allow the picture, but over the next few days I looked forward to driving that overpass and seeing my flower! Twenty some years later I still remember and often, even when it's not close to Easter and spring, I check that drain as I drive by. There's never been another flower. I know that's a lot of words to tell a story, but I really believe that flower was a miracle and a message for me, and I've spoken and written about it several times, then, and since.



The Ministry Planning Team wants you to know...



Parallel to the revival we call Spring, Easter is the message of *Life*, the *God of Life*, the *Gift of Life*, and the *love* that makes <u>life</u> worth living. The Jewish Passover coming around "the 13th of Nisan" puts it right at the approach of spring, and that puts <u>our</u> observations of the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus right into that same time frame. It is a serendipity that makes spring an even more important and meaningful time, but I don't really believe it is an accident. Living in SoCal it is almost always hard to distinguish the change of seasons the way it happens in other places in the world, especially the changes from winter to spring and from summer to fall. When the time comes that you don't have children living with you that is not only true for the seasons, it is also true week to week. In retirement often life seems to be just a string of Saturdays, you have to keep a calendar or check regularly to be certain what day it is, even the Sundays can be just the same. I have known people whose excuse for missing church was that they lost track of it being Sunday! To keep ourselves <u>spiritually</u> alive, we cannot let that happen

All of us want there to be factors and experiences that remind us we are alive, we are loved, and we are important, we have things to **do**! It is important for us to know that we are part of something much bigger than ourselves. We are individually so small, how can it be that we matter? Building on the thoughts of Bishop Bos when she spoke at our big anniversary in February, we need to learn to notice and identify the miracles around us, the gifts of God that reveal His presence, His caring, and our importance. God's presence in the world is too often described as a kind of control or even dominance, when it seems clear to me that it is such a generous, loving, and beautiful presence, subtle and not at all forcing things down our throat. Because of that it is important that we do our part, and notice, pay attention, and be thankful for all the magnificence of life and beauty around us. Things could always have been otherwise, so the "gifts" of grace and beauty we run into should be noticed and named and appreciated! Feeling God's presence begins with noticing God's gifts and the signs of His presence all around us. If you start naming them out loud and saying Thank You you'll be surprised at how many and how often God reminds each of us of His kindness and presence!

Steward your soul for a fuller life

Jesus teaches, "What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul?"—Mark 8:36, 37 (NIV)

Instead of the superficial "How's it going?" a wise colleague asks friends, "How is your soul?"

The question requires effort. To answer it I must plunge deep inside -below the constantly churning waters of everyday joys, hopes, ambitions, desires, anxieties and disappointments. These are so strong, especially our desires and ambitions, that if we are not careful they can absorb all our time and energy.

Jesus repeatedly warns us not to let our desires and our worries engulf us, keeping us from paying attention to the soul. Our soul is where we connect with God, the source of our greatest strength and truest identity. Without attention, our soul can dry up like a plant without water. As with all the treasures God has given us, we must be stewards of our souls.

The mystics of old and modern prophets (such as Richard Rohr, Marjorie Thompson or Howard Thurman) teach us to employ prayer, holy silence, and other spiritual disciplines to tend our souls and keep worldly worries and desires from overwhelming us.

This month, begin a daily practice of caring for your soul. You might begin with five minutes of spoken prayer followed by five minutes of silence. Or reflect deeply on a Scripture passage. Or try prayerful yoga. (Your pastor might be able to give you some resources or ideas.)

With a little practice and attention, you can become stronger, more centered and more spiritually resilient.
