The Past and the Future

en years ago, a well-known Christian author and contemporary theologian named Brian McLaren published an excellent book called *We Make the Road by Walking*. I have several of his previous books and several written since then, but that book is one of my favorites. I bought the book, as you can guess, because the title is absolutely intriguing, *and* happens to be accurate to my experiences over my life. Theories and directions have too often been rather useless because of the very special and unique realities that made my journey just exactly that, *my* journey!

As we built up to the celebration, and then had that great Sunday service marking 70 years for SSOV, I found myself thinking about the title of that book and how true and important the title wording is, not just for individuals, but for all who participate in this church. It was a genuine pleasure to see the pictures and hear the stories of SSOV since its beginnings, and especially over the construction of the worship center and the wonderful facilities you now have. The service, with all the great music participation, the really excellent address by Bishop Brenda Bos, and the presence of many people from the past and from the other two churches, was just a perfectly wonderful experience. However, though it may not have been an *elephant*, the big question that was palpably present in the room was what will we be and do from here? What will we become?

Any honest person is aware that the financial and membership realities at SSOV at this time present some options and possibilities. By the time you read this we will have had our Annual Meeting, and, *organizationally*,

perhaps some decisions and directions may have been decided and adopted. I am writing to describe the way the future history will be formed by the collected decisions and faith of each member as we move into whatever lies ahead. The times we are living in are not easy or simple, conscious intentionality and awareness are absolutely the best ways for us to "build the road by walking it". It definitely is going to require us paying real attention to what God is asking of us each step along the way. The big challenges and issues are actually usually rather simple to decide and choose. The values or principles involved are usually loudly debated or clearly identifiable, and one simply makes a choice that aligns with the values of love, compassion, forgiveness, and generosity that Jesus demonstrated over and over.

So, we do not usually make our mistakes in the big things. Our troubles come from the accumulation of choices and decisions we make in the smaller things we do and say. The times when we may not even have been aware that we *made* a choice, and certainly not a choice that will come back to bite us. It is too easy for our tiny and casual decisions of the minute to add up and drop on us as a heavy statement of the kind of person we have become. The season of Lent we are presently in is really about *exactly* those kinds of things. I am sure there is *nobody* at SSOV who is giving up criminal or overtly harmful behaviors for Lent.

Lenten thoughts about wealth

nstead of the superficial "How's it going?" a wise colleague asks friends, "How is your soul?"

The question requires effort. To answer it I must plunge deep inside -- below the constantly churning waters of everyday joys, hopes, ambitions, desires, anxieties and disappointments. These are so strong, especially our desires and ambitions, that if we are not careful they can absorb all our time and energy.

Jesus repeatedly warns us not to let our desires and our worries engulf us, keeping us from paying attention to the soul. Our soul is where we connect with God, the source of our greatest strength and truest identity. Without attention, our soul can dry up like a plant without water. As with all the treasures God has given us, we must be stewards of our souls.

The mystics of old and modern prophets (such as Richard Rohr, Marjorie Thompson or Howard Thurman) teach us to employ prayer, holy silence, and other spiritual disciplines to tend our souls and keep worldly worries and desires from overwhelming us.

This month, begin a daily practice of caring for your soul. You might begin with five minutes of spoken prayer followed by five minutes of silence. Or reflect deeply on a Scripture passage Or try prayerful yoga. (Your pastor might be able to give you some resources or ideas.)

With a little practice and attention, you can become stronger, more centered and more spiritually resilient.

The Past and the Future continued

We are all thinking about small and seemingly insignificant things in our disciplines for the 40 days, and that is exactly how we will "make the road" as we walk through each day's opportunities and demands. In the long run the course of our life is *not* the result of following a map or book of instructions, there are always complicating choices. There are bound to be many mistakes and missteps along the way. What determines our character and the "person" we become is a matter of our ideals and goals, and how we catch and correct the slips and failures as we go along. Consciously making certain we do not make that mistake again.

So, what will become of this community of Christians in a world of climate change, advancing digital controls and opportunities, global realities and human needs that challenge selfish nationalism, serious educational, racial, and economic isolation and suffering, and huge problems with ancient divisions and hatred? It will boil down, believe it or not, to how good and conscientious people (like you!) conduct their daily "as usual" lives. The actual answer to the question about what this church will become is going to be found in the composite picture of the accumulated faithfulness and loving outreach of the people who are members. The "Kingdom of God" has always been much more concerned with what is and what's coming than with what was true in the past. The New Testament portrays God over and over saying "Behold, I am making all things new!" In this "new" world we will be "making the road" by asking for and following God's principles and guidance, by following Jesus' example and teaching, and by paying attention and learning so that the road we each are making daily truly does lead SSOV to that goal of God's will being done, "on earth as it is in heaven."

We are all, in fact, *making the road by walking*. It is early in the year, and it is Lent, let's practice and learn to consciously do better in the little, momentary words and actions of our lives that often are such a window revealing the depth of our faith in and love of the God we worship. As we say so often in matters of love and caring, it's the <u>little</u> things that really make the difference!
